Meeting called to order at 6:02PM

- I. Intro by President- Introduction and agenda preview. Footage of recent car theft/shooting on 4<sup>th</sup> & Fairfax was shared.
- II. **Denver Police Department Guests and Updates-** Carlos Aragon from Denver Police Department, Commander of District 3 and Ryan Harris, Head of Sector 2 from Denver Police, shared updates on District 3, answered residents' questions and provided the following information:
  - a. District 3 has Cabinet meetings first Wednesday of every month 6pm-7pm at 1625 S. University Blvd (District 3 Substation).
  - b. The Denver Police are currently working on the active case of the car theft/shooting shown in the video footage. Not much can be shared as the case is still ongoing, but there is a person of interest/suspect that Denver Police is actively looking into.
  - c. Number of auto thefts in a year and ratio of auto thefts per resident in Hilltop compared to other jurisdictions are nowhere close (example of Cook county, IL was provided at 2,700 auto thefts in a year; Hilltop had <u>41 auto thefts in 2022</u>—filter by Hilltop/District 3). Denver Police Department has centralized the Auto theft investigations team. What used to be six different districts with 12-13 detectives got reduced to the top performing detectives from each district into one team. Centralizing the team improved overall reduction of car theft by 30%. It also reduced

overall crime by 39% in recognizing that arrests made from auto theft were by perpetrators charged for another crime (70% of 1500 car theft arrests in 2022).

- d. What community members can do to reduce the number of auto thefts: 1. Use a club (starting May, there will be a study on using a steering wheel club and its effect on theft); 2. Register vehicle under <u>DenverTrack</u>, a program where a vehicle owner preauthorizes Denver Police to track the GPS location of their vehicle (either by vehicle installed tracking device or other Bluetooth type tracking devices) only when stolen. Cook County, IL did a similar program and found that it reduced the desire to steal a car by 50%. DenverTrack started in March and effectiveness data will be released in 6 months, 9 months, etc. *Flyer provided at meeting and attached at the end of meeting minutes*. 3. Get an etching kit (inscribe a unique number) for catalytic converters to prevent theft. Event will be held on May 11th at Les Schwab Tire Center where etching on catalytic converters will be provided.
- e. Denver Police have weekly strategy meetings to predict where crime will happen and where it has been consistent. Compared to other sectors, they deemed Hilltop a safe neighborhood where there have only been little pockets of crime with a downward trend. Data on crime in District 3 and metro wide was provided.
- f. What community members can do to reduce crime in the neighborhood: 1. Call the non-emergency number (720-913-2000) for petty crime, file online or telephone report of suspicious behavior. Emphasis made by Officer Aragon on detailing the suspicious behaviors and not just the description of individual(s). 2. Create a neighborhood watch program. District 3 has a formalized process. Contact Mike Borquez, District 3 Community Resource officer (mike.borquez@denvergov.org). Andy Walvoord, Safety Committee chair, has conducted meetings on neighborhood watch in Hilltop. 3. Be vigilant with bringing packages inside and help with neighbors' packages. 4. Get to know your neighbors.
- g. Denver Police Department staffing is not at 100% but turning in the right direction. Currently there are 56 outstanding job offers and academy starting next month.
- III. Councilwoman Amanda Sawyer's office updates- Owen Brigner (Representative form Amanda Sawyer's) provided updates on what the office has done and is doing in regard to safety: In 2022, Amanda Sawyer led a gun buyback program turning weapons into gardening tools, supported legislation to shut down secondary market for catalytic converters to help stop thefts, and created the "Lights on District 5" initiative to help lower property crime. For this year, goal to hire more officers by increasing pay, providing signing bonuses and offering more training.

### IV. 2023 mayoral candidates in runoff election:

- a. Kelly Broff shared main reasons she got into mayor race was because of safety. She has spent time with officers to understand challenges and to reduce encampments so officers can spend their time going after crime. Her stance is to provide resources to the unhoused by building the infrastructure to house.
- b. Joshua Posner, a representative from Mike Johnston's campaign, shared that Mike is running to build America's best city and is committed to bringing in more safety officers. The website, <u>www.mikejohnstonformayor.com</u> was provided to look more into his policy and proposals to address safety in Denver.
- V. **Global Guardian-** Background: Resident, Elizabeth Benson, helped organize interest in hiring neighborhood security for Hilltop and reached out to Global Guardian, a security

company that Country Club is using, to learn more about their services. Representatives from Global Guardian, Seth Krummrich VP, Client Risk Management from Global Guardian and Spencer Tacken, VP, Operations, shared a slide deck detailing a two-phase plan for Hilltop. This was only a proposal of what they would execute in the neighborhood and for the neighbors to learn more about their services. No decision has been made as to whether or not to proceed with this company.

- a. About: International security firm that operates globally. Leadership is made up of military special operations and federal law enforcement with goal to provide security services for a safe environment unique to each client's challenges.
- b. Phase 1- One to three months with strong, 24/7 presence of security agents patrolling in clearly marked cars. Acts as a deterrent factor for criminals coming into the neighborhood.
- c. Phase 2- Brings hybrid technology such as CCTV and sensors. Security cameras are installed where neighborhood deems appropriate. Security cameras have AI technology that recognizes weapons like knives and guns, alerts agents to bring in local police and is monitored 24/7.
- d. Additional information shared by Global Guardian in answering residents' questions:
  - i. Security agents are a complement to law enforcement and do not make arrests.
    - 1. They will interact with the perpetrator to deescalate, stop the crime and collect information (the eyes and ears) to provide to law enforcement.
    - 2. There will also be a continuity of agents in the neighborhood where residents will see the same agents.
    - 3. They are all experienced agents who are vetted and insured and paying residents get a direct number to the patrols along with another 24/hour number.
  - ii. Neighborhood gets to make decisions and/or provide input on the following:
    - 1. whether the officers are armed.
    - 2. where to put the security cameras. Global Guardian looks at data on where the problem areas are in the neighborhood (including alleys) and provides suggestions. Cameras are installed with permission of homeowner if on private property and city licensing if on city ground.
  - iii. Patrols will know which homes are paying and focus on the marked homes.
  - iv. No self-service access to cameras; Global Guardian will provide footage upon request.
- VI. Open discussion/conversation with residents continued regarding security in the neighborhood.

# **PROTECT YOUR VEHICLE**


- Always lock your car, roll up the windows and take your keys.

### **Experienced Lessons Learned**:

- Persistent security presence = inhospitable to crime: SCCN example
- In all cases, heavy patrolling (including K-9) over time gave way to a hybrid solution
- <u>Complements</u> Law Enforcement; we are "left of the event"
- Agents: What we are not (RoboCop), What we are: deterring presence, eyes, ears, unblinking technical eye
